Small Town, Big Heart

Dalhart, Texas residents pay their respects to fallen soldier

There is no place like a small town when it comes time to come together and help each other. Often, it is one person that gets the ball rolling, but it always takes "a village" to get things done when you live in a small community. The people of Dalhart recently came together to show their respect, concern and patriotism when a local soldier was killed in Afgahanistan. It all started with a parent's thought ... "What would I want to see if it were my son or daughter coming home?" The answer was an American flag. That's how the planning process began to line the street from the airport to the funeral home with American flags to show our respects. Here at XIT, Billy Sisco is our number one patriot, and his effort, combined with many other people in Dalhart, helped us all come together to show our support for the family of Sgt. David Davis.



Patriotism is very real and heartfelt in many towns across this nation, but in Dalhart it became very personal when the news came that one of our own had fallen while serving our country in Afghanistan. Friday, September 25, 2009, in Dalhart, Texas, is a day that will live on in our minds forever. With overcast skies and a brisk wind, it would not be like any other Friday. It would not be a day full of anticipation for the weekend or the Friday night game. It would be very different and a day that many will not soon forget. Around 9 a.m., the people of Dalhart quietly began to gather along Seventh Street and Highway 54 West to honor and pay respects to Sgt. David Davis. Davis, 28, died Saturday, September 19, 2009 at Bagram Airfield in Afghanistan. He was assigned to the 32nd Transportation Company, 68th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion, 43rd Sustainment Brigade for the 4th Infantry Division stationed in Fort Carson, Colorado.


Men, women and children lined both sides of the street and roadway. With hundreds of large and small American flags flying in the breeze, and as the crisp wind brought the flags to attention, the feeling of patriotism was mixed with sadness for this young family who had sacrificed so much. People spoke quietly to one another and waited patiently for the procession. Then, as the skies began to clear, and the sun started to shine, the

CPNI and **YOU**

Customer Proprietary Network Information

XIT and the Federal Government (FCC) continue to take very seriously the protection of your telecommunications account information. Customer Proprietary Network Information, or CPNI, is the information in your XIT account that includes your calling charges, the optional services you subscribe to, and your usage data and calling patterns. In short, it is your private information about **your telephone service**. In order to protect your account from unauthorized access, a CPNI password should be set up on your account. Over the past year and half, XIT has worked diligently with our customers to get passwords set up on all of our accounts.

Updating your account information is an ongoing process. If you do not currently have a CPNI password established, or there has been a change in your contact information or mailing address, please contact your nearest XIT retail location. Our customer service personnel can assist you with your CPNI password set up and review your account to verify all information is correct. We appreciate your business and thank you for assisting us with our effort to maintain current and accurate information on your account record.

Hackers Are People, Too

Most of you have heard the term, "hacker." But, what is it? Or, more importantly, "who" is it? Hollywood leads you to believe this person is a misguided teenage, punk rocker, with too much time on their hands, involved in illegal deeds using their computer.

First, let's get things straight. The words "hacker" and "criminal" are not synonymous. I have quite a few friends that are hackers. I even fancy myself a bit of a hacker, but not on caliber with some of the net-gods that exist. A hacker is simply someone that enjoys "learning how things work." One online source defines a hacker as: "[Originally, someone who makes furniture with an axe]

- I. A person who enjoys exploring the details of programmable systems and how to stretch their capabilities, as opposed to most users, who prefer to learn only the minimum necessary.
- 2. One who programs enthusiastically (even obsessively) or who enjoys programming rather than just theorizing about programming.
- 3. A person capable of appreciating hack value.
- 4. A person who is good at programming quickly.
- 5. An expert at a particular program, or one who frequently does work using it or on it; as in 'a Unix hacker'. (Definitions I through 5 are correlated, and people who fit them congregate.)
- 6. An expert or enthusiast of any kind. One might be an astronomy hacker, for example.
- 7. One who enjoys the intellectual challenge of creatively overcoming or circumventing limitations."

Notice, that nowhere in that definition, did you see anything illegal. To use a Star Wars analogy, though, it is possible for a hacker to turn "to the dark side." We call criminal hackers, "Crackers." A person that breaks into computers or networks with the purpose of changing, deleting, or stealing information is a cracker.

Here's a scenario involving both types of people: One day, Joe Hacker is on the Internet, looking at various sites, when he finds an "address" he hasn't seen before. Upon entering this mysterious address, he finds himself at the heart of NORAD's missile defense system. A large hyperlink labeled, "Launch" sits squarely on his screen.

A "hacker" would contact NORAD and tell them about the "hole" in their security so it could be fixed. A "cracker" would push the button (or, more likely, sell the information to the highest bidder).

Using these definitions, we can actually label some of our greatest inventors as hackers. If Thomas Edison were alive today, he would probably wear the label proudly. Throw in Benjamin Franklin, Albert Einstein, etc. Heck, if you have a kid that takes apart the vacuum cleaner to see how it works, well, you have a hacker.



unmistakable sound of a helicopter could be heard overhead. And, there it was, an Osprey helicopter circling the sky at the airport. The helicopter maintained a low altitude and circled the airport while the family was there. Then, it slowly led the procession down Airport Road onto Highway 54 and Seventh Street. Following closely behind were the Patriot Guard Motorcyclists; the local-fire-rescue vehicles; the hearse; the family, and the military honor guard. As the procession neared Denver Avenue, the sounds from a lone bagpipe filled the air. The XIT Rangers proudly displayed their patriotism and respect by carrying the American flag gallantly on horseback. As the procession ended at the funeral home, a hush fell over the crowd as each and everyone reflected on the day's events. It was an experience that will never be forgotten. And, in some small way, we all were a part of something that many of us know very little about ... military tradition and ceremony. The flag-draped casket, the honor guard, and the military escort are all traditions that

honor and show respect for a fallen comrade.

Later, it was learned that several unexpected events brought the Osprey to Ingram Airfield in Dalhart that day. And for those of us that may not know the rest of the story, a Sgt. Kohlmery was onboard that morning, and he stood at attention in the open doorway throughout the flyover and saluted in honor of Sgt. Davis. The entire day's event brings home the reality that our "Freedom" as an American is not FREE. It is paid for with the lives of our service men and women as they serve our country in very difficult places and under extraordinarily difficult circumstances. Take a moment to remember them in your thoughts and prayers, and be sure to always respect the American flag and hold it dear.
